n each of the world's six main religions - Hinduism, Judaism, Buddhism, Christianity, Islam and Sikhism - stories play a very

important part. They have been used for many hundreds of years to teach people about their faith in a way which makes difficult messages easier to understand. Many stories tell of times in the lives of religious teachers, leaders, gods and goddesses. Others explain mysterious events such as how the world was created or what happens when you die. Many have a strong moral

or lesson to teach.





he collection of stories in this book comes from Islam. Islam is the religion followed by Muslims. They believe in

one God, whom they call Allah. They follow Allah's guidance throughout their lives. Islam began in the 7th century CE in the country we now call Saudi Arabia in the Middle East. A man called Muhammad was chosen by Allah to receive his message for the world. He was the last of all the prophets of Islam. The messages were later collected together to make the Qur'an, the Muslim holy book. Allah did not speak to Muhammad directly. His messenger was an angel called Jibril. In this book, you can read some of the stories which show how Allah gave His message to the world through His angels and prophets.

Did you know?

Muslims believe that Allah has sent many prophets to teach people how to live. Muhammad was the last and greatest of these prophets. Among the prophets that came before him were Adam, Nuh (Noah), Ibrahim (Abraham), Musa (Moses) and Isa (Jesus). They are also important figures in Judaism and Christianity. Muslims often write the letters 'pbuh' after the names of the prophets. These stand for the words 'peace be upon him'.
