Red jacketed waiters remind us of the long lost New York iconized by Frank Sinatra. Settle in at the bar for a night to remember, and chat up the Upper East Side clientele. Woody Allen plays on Tuesdays at this spot where live jazz dominates. Pricey cover charge after 9 pm.

One of the most astounding spaces to sip a cocktail in NYC, inside a breathtaking nine-story Victorian atrium. In this landmarked 1883 Gothic Revival building, the bar is a study in gold and green, with old-fashioned iron stools, and lighting via small lamps. Get a table and luxuriate in the comfortable opulence.

Down the block from MoMA, B Bar is as stunningly beautiful as a palace, with elaborate namesake crystal chandeliers everywhere you look. At the bar, you may snag one of the bar stools for two (which seem to be popping up more and more). Cocktails will be elegantly presented in iconic Baccarat cut crystal glassware.

### 341 PLAY CHESS IN THE PARK

Match wits with those who have made this a daily sport. It's usually 5 dollars a game, played in a most speedy way. Look for guys in the SW corner of Washington Square Park (some cheating and trash talk!), the west side of Union Square Park, and Central Park's Chess and Checkers House off 65th Street.

### 342 DINE AT THE BAR INSTEAD OF AT A TABLE

Solo and duo diners, this is your chance to engage in conversation, and dine at those restaurants where it's nearly impossible to get a reservation. Most restaurants will allow you to set up shop at the bar, but some places encourage it, like: Cosme, Union Square Cafe, Acme, Casa Mono.

#### 345 WATCH A PARADE

NYC hosts over 30 parades a year, bringing out the population to view. There are the well-known spectacles, like the Macy's Thanksgiving Parade, but dig deeper to find smaller, fun processions like the colorful Lunar New Year in Chinatown, the Easter Parade where everyone dons their finest bonnets, and the Gay Pride where anyone can march.
