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5 secrets about PLAZA MAYOR

251 LAMPPOSTS

Centro 2

Engraved in four lampposts are images that tell the history Plaza Mayor. From 1609 until 1822, trials were held here, there was a huge fire in 1790, a farmers market, a bullfighting arena in the 1620s and a square where lavish masked gatherings were held in the 17th and 18th century.

252 BULLFIGHTS

In 1619, Plaza Mayor hosted bullfights to commemorate important festivities. There were two bullfights every day: a morning session for the common people and an afternoon bullfight for the King and Nobles at double the price. The last bullfight took place in 1846 to celebrate the double wedding of Isabel II and her sister María Luisa.

253 HELL ALLEY

This gloomy alley was given the rather majestic name of Victory Arch Street in 1854, but is more popularly known as Hell Alley (Callejón del Infierno) after huge flames came out at the other end in Calle Mayor, during the second, most brutal fire in Plaza Mayor in 1672.

Inside the Cutlers Arch (Arco de Cuchilleros) there is a discrete stone platform with a semi-circular metallic handrail that played a surprisingly decisive role in the history of Madrid. It was here that the monk Antonio rallied a large crowd of Madrilenians against the French invader in 1808, starting the War of Independence.

At the end of the 16th century, Plaza Mayor did not exist yet. The muddy lagoon of Lujan, which used to be here, was a popular duck hunting spot for kings and also served as a primitive farmers market on the outskirts of the village of Madrid. Felipe II designated Madrid as capital of the kingdom, transforming the lagoon into a square inspired by the Roman Forum.

286 CHAMBERÍ **Chamberí** (5)

If you are into cuisine, then head to Calle Ponzano or to Olavide Square in Trafalgar with its cosy garden and terraces for some tapas. The district became really glamorous in the 19th century, when Madrid's aristocracy moved here. Zurbano Street is still one of the most prestigious addresses in Europe (according to the New York Times).

287 BARRIO DE LAS LETRAS **Centro** (2)

This bohemian and artistic neighbourhood with its narrow streets almost makes you feel as if you are in a Castilian village. Take a walk down Calle del León, Calle del Prado, Calle Cervantes and Calle Lope de Vega. Literary figures of the Spanish Golden Age such as Lope de Vega, Quevedo, Góngora and Cervantes used to live here.

289 SALAMANCA

Salamanca ③

Named after the church, this neighbourhood is considered to be the Soho of Madrid. The main streets to discover are Calle Almirante, Calle Barquillo and Calle Fernando VI. Don't be afraid to walk in the adjacent small streets, as there are plenty of cool shops, galleries and bars to discover.

Madrid's chicest and most glamorous neighbourhood, with the main shopping streets running parallel to each other: Calle Serrano, Calle Claudio Coello and Calle Lagasca. The statue of its founder is in Margues de Salamanca Square which intersects with the high-end Calle Ortega y Gasset.

This neighbourhood is a melting pot of people and cultures. The abundance of Indian restaurants in Calle Lavapiés is just one sign of this. In Calle Argumosa there is a bustling bar and tapas scene that has been taken over by young entrepreneurs because the rents are lower here. A bit further down in Plaza de Lavapiés you will run into Tabacalera, a massive street art centre.

This makes the theatre more accessible and more affordable, giving new authors and playwrights a break.

Commissioned by the Spanish Opera Society and inaugurated on Isabel II's birthday in 1856, this theatre was used for the performance of zarzuela. In 1984, the Spanish government took over the building. Now it also hosts performances by dance and flamenco companies.

Probably one of the most beautiful buildings in Madrid because of its majestic exterior and interiors. It was inaugurated in 1917. Originally built for opera performances, the theatre can accommodate an audience of more than 1000 people. Nowadays international shows are staged here.

The old Luchana made way for a new theatre, with several halls, that caters to all kinds of audiences. The programme changes continuously, with productions by young theatrical companies. This is the theater to go to if you like alternative theater and love to have many options to choose from.

This upscale NH hotel is particularly well located, overlooking Castellana and Colón Square. It was completely refurbished in 2016. The 146 rooms have a modern and sleek design mixing white and light greys. The solarium and swimming pool on the fourth floor are spacious and very comfortable.



5 DAY EXCURSIONS outside Madrid

446 EL ESCORIAL

Located 45 km to the northwest of Madrid, you can get here by bus from Moncloa. The village was named after the impressive and majestic monastery. Initially built as a mausoleum for King Philip II and his family, it was also designed to commemorate the battles he won against the Frenchmen in Picardy.

447 SEGOVIA www.turismo desegovia.com

About 90 km north of Madrid, Segovia in the Castile and Leon region, is a world heritage city. Stroll down pedestrian streets, see the famous Roman aqueduct and the cathedral as well as the 11thcentury Alcázar Palace, where Queen Isabel agreed to finance Christopher Columbus's adventures.

448 **TOLEDO**

www.toledoturismo.com This World Heritage city is located about 70 km south of Madrid and can be easily reached by train from Atocha station. Also called the city of three cultures, as Christians, Muslims and Jews lived together there for centuries. Toledo was also the home of the painter El Greco.

449 EL PARDO ROYAL Palace

This palace was built in the 16th century, inheriting some elements from the original medieval structure over which it was built. Check the opening hours before going, as this palace has also been used as accommodation for visiting heads of state since 1983. Bus line 601 from Moncloa.

450 ARANJUEZ

Declared a World Heritage Cultural Landscape by UNESCO, you can easily get here, by bus, from Estación Sur (a 50-minute journey). Visit the majestic Royal Palace, which was built in a Renaissance and neo-Classical style. Don't miss the gardens with their fountains. The Palace is very large and will take a while to visit.
