You can ask for it double layered, the pinnacle of poutine design. Poutini's has a plethora of varieties, including vegetarian. They are happy to play demo tapes if you're a member of a local band.

18 NOM NOM NOM POUTINE

707 Dundas St W Downtown ① +1 647 636 0707 nomnomnom.ca Nom Nom Nom is another venue dedicated almost solely to poutine. It has a fun walk-up window with picnic tables situated on the sidewalk. For a very different style of poutine, try the Galvaude: seasoned chicken and peas, along with the traditional cheese curds and gravy.

19 KNUCKLE SANDWICH

This laidback spot creates freshly made sandwiches, unique versions of poutine and serves a variety of local beers. The Danforth poutine adds a Greek twist with feta cheese and capers. The patio is a comfortable place to sit on summer days. Portions are huge, so arrive hungry.

20 CLUNY BISTRO

The coq au vin poutine is made with chicken, red wine, bacon and cheese. It's a unique twist on this heart-stopping dish. The decor is beautiful. It sets a beautiful scene for a few Instagram photos if you're the type who likes to post your adventures.



5 places that serve UNIQUE CAESARS

They've concocted a delicious version of a Caesar cocktail. Instead of the usual rim spice, they've used za'atar seasoning and Kaffir lime to flavour this Canadian classic.



127 RODNEY'S OYSTER HOUSE

469 King St W Downtown ① +1 416 363 8105 rodneysoyster house.com A Caesar always pairs well with seafood. Rodney's Oyster House knows it well. They've used Walter's (waltercaesar.com) mix for their house blend. For a garnish, they've added a large fresh gulf shrimp. It's spicy and acidic, just the way a Caesar is supposed to taste.

128 CHERRY STREET BAR-B-QUE

275 Cherry St Downtown ② +1 416 461 5111 cherrystbbq.com Cherry Street Bar-B-Que is a no-frills joint focused on southern-style BBQ. That's why it seems funny they'd create such a tasty version of this Canadian cocktail. They serve their Caesar flavoured with BBQ sauce, tamarind sauce and a whole rib as a garnish.

Their version comes garnished with everything but the kitchen sink. You'll need to munch on all the garnishes before you can get to this version, which is full of real horseradish.

They are garnished with lots of different ingredients. Much of the menu depends on what's available locally, and you will find it's different almost every week.

Northeast of Dufferin St and Eglinton Ave York-Crosstown ③

202 BLOOR-YORKVILLE

Between Avenue Road and Yonge St, north of Bloor St W Midtown ③ bloor-yorkville.com The area near Dufferin and Eglinton hosts a variety of design stores. If you're looking for furniture or home decor items, this is a good area to visit. Stores like Elte and Metropolis Living are situated within walking distance of each other. Take a wander around and find trendy designs.

Bloor-Yorkville isn't a neighbourhood in which you'll find a lot of discount stores. This area is known for all its high-end stores. There's a Louis Vuitton, Holt Renfrew, 119 Corbo, Chanel and Nordstrom located within walking distance of each other. There are also nice boutique stores here.

203 YONGE-EGLINTON

Uptown ③

The Yonge and Eglinton area is about 2 kilometres in radius and filled with lots of shops offering designer labels for adults and children. It's also home to the Yonge-Eglinton Shopping Centre, so lots of spots where you can empty your wallet. It's best to start at the intersection of Yonge and Eglinton Avenue West, then take your time wandering both east and west along the corridor.

Toronto FC is a relatively new team in the city. Hockey is no longer the only sport in town, as soccer is quickly gaining in popularity. Games are played at BMO Field, a beautiful open-air venue located in Exhibition Place. You can get great seats quite easily.

The southern part of the Niagara Region offers a milder climate than that north of Toronto. This allows for the growth of the Carolinian forest. This type of forest is quite rare in Ontario.

The trails in this area offer hikers a chance to experience a little bit of adventurous hiking. There are some very steep parts that require you to climb and descend ladders. It's best to attempt this trail with children over the age of 7.

This trail in Eugenia offers several opportunities to explore. If you are adventurous, follow the trail to the bottom of the gorge, then follow the riverbed up to the waterfall. In summer the water levels are low, and you can stand at the bottom of the falls.
