The restaurant emphasises quality, regional produce sourced from small farmers in Brandenburg. They also serve an excellent brunch in the weekends. Lots of good coffee bars and ice-cream parlours in the neighbourhood.

The restaurant was designed with the help of a fengshui master and has a nice view on the Volksbühne and an outside terrace.

45 LI.KE Grünberger Strasse 69 Friedrichshain ④ +49 (0)30 2900 9428 likethaivegan.de Here's one of the first vegan restaurants that took vegan food to another level. It's located right between the Kollwitzplatz and the famous Water Tower and offers a superb dining experience. It's a little on the expensive side for Berlin but Josita Hartanto's vegan dishes are worth it – think pear and chilli risotto with *tandoori* cabbage and *nori tempeh* rolls. Nice outside terrace.

We have a bit of a soft spot for this Thai place in Boxhagener Platz ('Boxi'). The kitschy, colourful interior, the plastic tablecloths, the Bruce Lee references in the loo, the sunny terrace, the mouthwatering food, the homemade lemonades! Most of the food is tapas style so you can share with your friends.



The 5 best **GAY BARS**

136 CAFE NEUES UFER

Hauptstrasse 157 Schöneberg ⑦ +49 (0)30 7895 7900 neuesufer.de Located in one of the most famous and oldest gay neighbourhoods of Berlin, this was the first gay and lesbian cafe in Europe with large street-facing windows. David Bowie and Iggy Pop lived in the house next door at the end of the 1970s and were regular guests.

140 **ROSES BAR** Oranienstrasse 187 Kreuzberg ② +49 (0)30 6156 570 A sign hanging over the bar tells patrons to leave their 'heteronormativity' at the door; if not, they can leave themselves. It's funny and it says a lot about the place, which attracts a lesbian crowd. You will love its totally chill and laidback atmosphere.

This after hours gay bar is very popular, especially on Monday nights, when you get two drinks for the price of one. The darkroom attracts mostly fetishists and leather-clad men, who come here to cruise, so do expect a lot of action.

Thursday is gay night, Tuesday it's women only. And on all the other days of the week it's everything in between or behind. The building is an early 20thcentury furniture (*Möbel*) house that has been turned into a lively bar, decorated by contemporary Berlin artists and designers. Go here for eclectic music and DJs and the super friendly atmosphere. The entrance is on Dresdner Strasse.

Don't let the inconspicuous outside fool you; this is a place where everything is possible. If you can't get enough of pink, plush and Virgin Mary figures, this might be your thing. It used to be a place for the LGBT crowd but that changed over the last years. Parties here go on for ever.

The 5 most unique CONCEPT STORES

216 THE SQUARE BERLIN

Französische Str. 40 Mitte ① +49 (0)30 2067 0940 thesquareberlin.de Tired of Berlin's shabby chic and in the mood to really dress up like a film star? Then this is the place you should go to. In this huge (750 m²) concept store on the very touristy but oh so beautiful Gendarmenmarkt, you'll find international luxury fashion brands like Louboutin or Hermès but also design furniture, perfumes and jewellery.

217 SOUL OBJECTS

Not everything is vintage, but you can expect to find carefully curated objects like traditional grooming and shaving tools, porcelain plates with tattoo motifs or exclusive perfumes just to name a few.

The in-store coffee shop serves absolutely delicious coffee and cakes.

This hip concept store brings back some of the hugely popular trash parties that happened just after the wall fell in 1989. It is named after the Depeche Mode album *ULTRA*, for which the band recorded a video about a great trash party in the (non-existent) hotel Ultra. The carefully curated products are the shop's 'guests'.



5 wonderful INDEPENDENT BOOKSTORES

236 **OCELOT**

Brunnenstrasse 181 Mitte ① +49 (0)30 9789 4592 ocelot.de This beautiful, oak panelled bookstore is connected with the library of Berlin's Mitte-district. There's a carefully curated selection of fiction and non-fiction, children's books, and arty magazines. The English selection is small but you won't mind when you know there's an in-store coffee bar where it's totally okay to sip coffee and eat cake (made by Wunderkuchen) while reading.

237 ZABRISKIE

Reichenbergerstrasse 150 Kreuzberg ② +49 (0)30 6956 6714 zabriskie.de This super cute and charming bookstore specialises in international books on nature and culture and everything below the mainstream radar, like books on counterculture or drugs, but also very high-quality children's books. They serve damn good coffee as well. A real gem in a lovely, lively neighbourhood.





5 MOVIES from after 1989 that were shot entirely in Berlin

306 RUN LOLA RUN (LOLA RENNT) TOM TYKWER, 1998 With Franka Potente and Moritz Bleibtreu.

An action thriller in which the red-haired Lola (Franka Potente) runs against time through the city of Berlin to come up with 100.000 marks to save her boyfriend Manni (Moritz Bleibtreu) after he botched a money delivery. Three different alternatives may happen depending on some minor event along Lola's run. Includes a fabulous shot on the Oberbaum Bridge.

307 GOOD BYE, LENIN!

WOLFGANG BECKER, 2003 With Daniel Brühl and Katrin Sass This feel-good film shows the beginning of the end of communism in Berlin and the destruction of the Wall through the eyes of young Alex. To protect his fragile mother from a fatal shock after a long coma, he must keep her from learning that her beloved nation, East Germany as she knew it, has disappeared.

309 A COFFEE IN BERLIN (OH BOY) JAN-OLE GERSTER, 2012

With Tom Schilling and Friederike Kempter The story told in this political thriller begins in East Berlin in 1984, five years before the end of communism in Europe, and ends in 1991. The film traces the gradual disillusionment of Gerd Wiesle, a member of the Stasi, East Germany's all-powerful secret police, whose mission is to spy on a celebrated writer and actress couple.

A tragicomedy and self-ironic portrait of a young man who drops out of university and ends up wandering the streets of Berlin. He tries to participate in life but struggles to find his place. The tension between the black comedy and the underlying backdrop of Berlin's inescapable history is knife-edged. Filmed in black and white, the film has a certain Nouvelle Vague feel.

310 VICTORIA

SEBASTIAN SCHIPPER, 2015 With Laia Costa and Frederick Lau This film follows exchange student Victoria (Laia Costa) on a dark night out with a band of criminal Berliners. It was shot in Berlin in one continuous, uninterrupted take with a small cast and crew, in the wee small hours (from around 4.30 am to 7 am) on April 27, 2014. Fantastic score by Nils Frahm.

The Topography, which used to be the SS police station, is now a documentation centre about all the horrible acts that were committed in the Third Reich. The remaining 200 metres of the Wall at the Niederkirchnerstraße – which marked the border between East and West – have been preserved and now are part of the Topography of Terror Documentation Center. An absolute must!

Checkpoint Charlie, the Berlin Wall crossing place that symbolises the Cold War, has degenerated into a seedy tourist trap. The 360° Asisi Panorama is a better option: you'll relive everyday life in the vicinity of the Berlin Wall on a fictitious autumn day in the 1980s. Don't miss the fine pictures of the fall of the Wall in the foyer.

Don't expect to find any tourists here. To be honest there's not much to see: no hipster shops, no museums, no bars, no memorials. But there is a piece of the Wall here, and it's intact and genuine – what they call a 'wild Wall'.

The 5 most BEAUTIFUL LAKES around Berlin

451 GROSS GLIENICKER SEE Potsdam

This lake is a little bit further away from the city but it's absolutely worth the trip, not only because of the extremely clear water, but also because of the two little green islands. There are two sandy beaches and there's a bus stop near the lake.



452 **SCHLACHTENSEE**

Steglitz-Zehlendorf

This is one of the most beautiful lakes that public transportation will ever take you to. The Schlachtensee, on the border of the Grünewald, is rated Berlin's cleanest lake. It's a pristine spot for swimming as well as an ideal hiking area. Go to the Fischer Hütte for a cold post-swim beer.

Berlin's largest lake, east of Köpenick, is fed by the Spree. The lower section of the lake – the Kleiner Müggelsee – is perfect for swimming and a chill-out afternoon. The big Müggelsee is perfect for a boat trip – there are boats for rent. A perfect place for dinner is the Spreearche, a log-house that you can only reach by mini-ferry.

This less frequented but clean and beautiful lake is a bit more difficult to reach. There's only one real beach at the lake, next to the restaurant Landleben Potsdam.

The large Lietzensee can get pretty crowded because of its proximity to the city, but still it's absolutely worth a visit. The Parkhaus Lietzensee is stunning and sells ice cream on sunny afternoons.
