7 SOUTHPORT GROCERY AND CAFE 3552 N Southport Lakeview (5) +1 773 665 0100 southportgrocery.com The city's (and perhaps the country's) original farm-to-table restaurant, Lula opened in 1999 and, miraculously, has seldom repeated a specials menu since. From unique brunch dishes to lush, coursed-out dinners featuring farmfresh produce and protein, it's a favorite destination for locals as well as visitors in-the-know. Don't skip dessert: the carrot cake is a must.

With just enough tables to accommodate popping in for breakfast or lunch (and secret dinners), this bustling staple in the heart of Lincoln Park's shopping district prides itself on from-scratch favorites like quiches with fresh ingredients, finger-lickin' sweet entrees, and chopped salads that rotate with the seasons. The grocery features housemade preserves and local purveyors.

5 **VERY SMALL** bars

131 THE VICTOR BAR

The simple menu is divided into Shaken and Stirred, with a nice mix of standards (old fashioned, sazerac) alongside originals (Scotty Doesn't Know: scotch, averna, lemon juice, maple syrup), and a handful of French wines.

132 MATCHBOX

770 N Milwaukee Avenue River West ① +1 312 666 9292 matchboxbar.com With barely enough room to squeeze into seats, this cocktail bar dates back to 1945 and was recently restored. Fortunately, its menu still reflects the classics, built in the classic style: with powdered sugar and fresh juice. Shimmy into a seat and taste the difference in the bar's gimlets, Tom Collinses, and famously strong margaritas.

Boasting one of the city's most impressive beer menus, there are varieties and flavors to suit every taste. Check the specials board or ask any of the friendly bar staff to recommend a favorite. Order a side of fried cheese curds, root for whatever game's on the TV, and kick back.

If you've strolled through the Chicago Athletic Association Hotel, you've probably walked right past this itty-bitty boîte whose vintage stained-glass doors keep it successfully hidden. Behind them are just eight seats, a single bartender, and a collection of some of the oldest, rarest spirits in the world – with the prices to match.

Tucked behind a side door at an enormous party bar, this 14-seat cocktail den is as laidback as its mixologist-host, Lance Bowman. After a complimentary welcome drink, inventive interpretations of classics are up for grabs alongside originals incorporating everything from toasted marshmallows to palo santo. The hip-hop soundtrack keeps the drinks from coming off too seriously.

191 THE ROOKERY BUILDING

192 MONADNOCK Building

53 W Jackson Boulevard The Loop (2) +1 312 922 1890 monadnock building.com Completed in 1888 during the city's building boom following the Great Chicago Fire, this 11-story building was the world's first skyscraper. Renovated twice thereafter, The Rookery was touched by not one but four of the city's most storied architects: Daniel Burnham and John Wellborn Root, Frank Lloyd Wright, and William Drummond.

Don't judge this historic skyscraper by its plain-jane exterior. Its solid, nononsense façade was a design choice when architects Daniel Burnham and John Wellborn Root were commissioned for the new commercial building in the late 1870s. Hiding inside are all the gilded flourishes common to the Victorian era – notably the decorative aluminium staircases that break up the long hallways.

245 FORMAL GARDEN

AT: HUMBOLDT PARK 3019 W Division St Humboldt Park ④ +1 312 742 7529 chicagoparkdistrict.com In peak summer, this vast modern garden is a sea of blue and purple thanks to its dense crops of sage, asters, blazing star, ironweed and more. Hidden from view by a dense 'shoulder' hedge – a nod to the 'City of Big Shoulders' nickname – it feels private and quiet despite its location between Pritzker Pavilion and the Modern Wing of the Art Institute.

This quaint park functions almost like a courtyard connecting a handful of historic homes in the city's Prairie District. The beautiful formal garden features tidy landscaping, neatly raked gravel paths, and a sculptural tribute to local activist Jane Addams. At the center is the Botanical Gardens Fountain, adding a tranquil soundtrack to the small space.

When completed in 1908, this stately Formal Garden boasted year-round landscaping designed by seminal architect Jens Jensen. The garden features a semi-circular design and a central reflection pool – which has long been dry. A complete restoration project launched shortly before the pandemic, though is currently on hold. For now, just the garden's central flowers are maintained.

Set in a Mies van der Rohe-inspired building, this private arts club maintains a street-level gallery open to the public. International stars and local up-andcomers alike have staged traditional framed wall hangings, site-specific installations in the garden, and jawdropping takeovers of the gallery space.

Though Secrist's roster of artists doesn't stray too far from painting, drawing, sculpture and collage, the exhibitions are anything but traditional. The gallery is known to paint gallery walls a stark aqua to help works pop, or install a yellow stripe on its floor to create space for abstract sculpture installations.

On a busy stretch of this hip hood, Vertical Gallery packs in the crowds for dense exhibitions inspired by street art, pop culture, and highly graphic illustrations. Many works are grouped directly next to each other to maximize wall space, and the range of art – from graffiti writers to hyper-realistic painters – is a treat.

Spanning seven floors with boxseat views of the ballpark, it's finished in a vintage clubhouse feel with leather details, brass fixtures, and ivy-green accents. Outposts of some of the city's most popular foodie spots are just downstairs.

As the northernmost outpost of the 21c group of museum-hotels, Chicago's location features this mini-chain's knack for marrying curious visual arts installations with modern, comfortable rooms and suites. Renowned local artists are invited to take over the walls throughout the year, and lecture and performance series are sprinkled into the calendar.

This little garden and its larger location, on Jackson Park's vast Wooded Island, are remnants from the Chicago World's Fair of 1893. A mile west on 57th Street, the University of Chicago's commercial district has options for light bites.

With 200 acres of prairies, meadows, nature vistas and more, Humboldt Park is one of the largest parks on the North Side. All paths lead to the Boathouse in the center of the park overlooking a pleasant lagoon. Street vendors sell Puerto Rican snacks, and during the warm months, swan-shaped pedal boats are for rent.

445 GREAT LAWN AT MILLENNIUM PARK

201 E Randolph St Millennium Park (2) +1 312 742 1168 millenniumpark.org A state-of-the-art sound system and genius quick-dry drainage system make this green patch adjacent to Pritzker Pavilion one of the poshest lawns in the city. During summer evenings, the Frank Gehry-designed bandshell hosts free concerts, and the city flocks with picnic baskets to enjoy the twilight soundtrack.
