Afterward, stroll a few blocks to the Greenway and enjoy your meal on what was once an aboveground highway.

Ba Le is a Vietnamese grocery store stocked with favorite Vietnamese snacks and baked goods. Most importantly, it is known to have the freshest *banh mi* in town. Each *banh mi* is made to order with deliciously flaky, freshly baked buns, and is even better when paired with a refreshing Vietnamese iced coffee.

Paris Creperie offers both sweet and savory crepes in the heart of Coolidge Corner, but the winner is the John Gouda-Man crepe, packed with smoked turkey and gooey Gouda cheese. This unassuming spot is perfect for a quick lunch before browsing the nearby bookshops and vintage stores.

At Greco, you can enjoy classic gyro wraps brimming with fresh ingredients tucked into warm, soft pita bread. The crowd favorite is the tender lamb gyro, stuffed with traditional ingredients, including hand-cut fries. Don't miss the crispy zucchini chips with tangy tzatziki sauce.

### 241 BOSTON CUSTOM HOUSE

Originally a hub for maritime duties, this neoclassical building now serves as a Marriott timeshare hotel. Its observatory offers stunning harbor views and is accessible to the public during limited hours for a fee.

### 242 BOSTON PUBLIC LIBRARY

### 291 BEACON HILL

Beacon Hill is the embodiment of Boston with its narrow, gas-lit streets and historic brick row houses. This picturesque neighborhood, rich in old-world charm, offers Federal-style and Victorian architecture, once home to literary figures like Louisa May Alcott and Henry David Thoreau. You can even explore their former residences along Pinckney Street and the charming Louisburg Square.

### 292 CHINATOWN

Boston's Chinatown is a vibrant hub of Asian cultures, offering an authentic cultural experience with its myriad of Chinese and Vietnamese eateries, bakeries, and late-night spots. ### 386 REVERE BEACH INTERNATIONAL SAND SCULPTING FESTIVAL

#### 390 PORCHFEST

Somerville beta.somerville artscouncil.org/ porchfest/porchfest-2024 Downtown Lowell transforms each July, towards the end of the month, into a hub of traditional music, dance, and crafts. As the second-largest free folk festival in the U.S., it features multiple stages showcasing diverse music performances, ethnic foods, and local arts. This festival continues celebrating folk heritage from its predecessor, the National Folk Festival.

Every spring at the start of May, Harvard Square hosts MayFair, a celebration of the arts, food, and community. The event features three stages of diverse live music, including folk, rock, and funk. Local restaurants set up outdoor dining, and the streets come alive with food vendors, street performers, and chalk art on the streets, creating a festive atmosphere.

Mid-May, Somerville's porches transform into stages for an annual, decentralized festival that showcases local musicians across various genres. Residents open their porches for intimate performances, and visitors are encouraged to bring chairs or blankets to enjoy the music in a relaxed atmosphere, fostering community connections in a festive setting.

With engaging exhibits on dinosaurs, marine life, and mammals, children can explore and learn about diverse ecosystems. It is a fantastic destination for all.

Since 1877, the Swan Boat Ride has been a beloved Boston tradition, offering families a tranquil cruise through the Public Garden's lagoon. Inspired by the Richard Wagner opera *Lohengrin*, these foot-powered boats with fiberglass swans delight children with views of ducks and swans.

From mid-May through November, the New England Aquarium and Boston Harbor City Cruises host whale-watching tours departing from Boston Harbor. Families can spot humpback, finback, and minke whales, and might even see dolphins and other marine life. Engaging onboard naturalists enhance the adventure with fascinating facts.

At the aquarium, children can experience up-close animal encounters, like observing Atlantic harbor seals while learning about their biology and habitat from trainers. Other interactive exhibits include observing penguin species in their daily routines. It's ideal for all those fascinated by ocean life.

### 5 COASTAL excursions

### 441 ROCKPORT Cape Ann North of Boston (1)

Rockport, located on Cape Ann's tip, has charming seaside galleries, lobster rolls with ocean views, and iconic landmarks like Motif #1, often called the mostpainted building in the world. Visitors can spend the day exploring Bearskin Neck's shops and stroll sandy beaches before enjoying sunset views from Halibut Point State Park.

### 442 IPSWICH North of Boston (1)

Crane Beach's expansive sands and scenic dunes are perfect for walking or horseback riding. From Castle Hill, the grand estate of Richard Teller Crane Jr., there are sweeping views of the beach and Atlantic Ocean. The estate's historic mansion and beautifully landscaped grounds offer a glimpse into New England's past and are worth exploring.
