My strength lies in connecting insights from science, practice, and art. The KIM² Concept as a Foundation for Phygital Organizational Change

Every leader guiding an organization in times of phygital transformation encounters it sooner or later: your external **and** internal customers² think, feel, and act differently from you. These differences are not an obstacle but an invitation to transformation. They call for leadership that connects, for language that carries meaning, and for a shared framework that renders the complexity of collaboration both transparent and workable.

Following the book “*Eager for a Smart Dialogue with KIM²?*”, this publication appears as a deepening foundation. In recent years, the **KIM²** concept has proven its value: in theory and practice, in both public and private contexts. It has been disseminated, reprinted, discussed, and applied within the *Working 3.0* program, serving as a guide for those striving to realize meaningful change.

What does it mean to work with KIM²?

KIM² stands for **Customer Interaction Management²**. It is both the art and the science of (re)designing innovative work organizations so that, through optimal collaboration and communication with both external and internal customers², physical services with digital support can be delivered quickly, accurately, and responsibly.

This approach perfectly aligns with what we today recognize as **phygital transformation**: the intelligent combination of human interaction and digital support within complex processes. **KIM²** positions itself as a **human-centered complement to technological innovations**.

The Six PACBIS Perspectives: A Scientific Foundation for Meaningful Organizational Design

KIM² operates through six integrated perspectives, brought together in the acronym **PACBIS**. This framework helps organizations think systemically, listen narratively, and act collectively.

P – Participatory Observation ***(Anthropology & Action Research)***

Observing with the stakeholders. Participatory observation is rooted in ethnographic fieldwork, practice-based research, and reflective observation. It strengthens collective insight and prevents blind spots during change processes.

A – Alignment ***(Strategic Management & Organizational Studies)***

Aligning goals, structures, roles, and processes. This perspective connects to alignment models such as those of Kaplan & Norton and strategic frameworks that provide coherence and direction within complex organizations.

C – Construction ***(Narrative Psychology & Constructivism)***

Giving meaning to experiences, data, and context. Inspired by the works of Jerome Bruner and Kenneth Gergen, construction teaches us how organizations shape their reality through language and collective storytelling.

B – Governance ***(Public Administration & Systems Theory)***

Steering through interaction, not merely control. This perspective aligns with systems thinkers such as Peter Senge and adaptive governance models where leaders facilitate rather than dominate.

I – Interpretation

(Hermeneutics & Interpretative Organizational Theory)

Interpreting signals and patterns. Based on sensemaking (Karl Weick), hermeneutics (Hans-Georg Gadamer), and data-driven decision-making that links meaning to behavior and context.

S – Collaboration

(Social Capital & Co-creation Theory)

Co-creating within networks and ecosystems. Collaboration is inspired by social learning theories (Etienne Wenger, communities of practice) and co-creation principles that place customer interaction² at the center.

Together, these six perspectives form a cyclical working model that makes the multiple logic of KIM² operational—not as a rigid framework, but as a compass for those who want to guide deep, collective change.

Bridge to EGov 3.0: The Phygital Government in the Making

The digital acceleration in the public sector makes it clear that classical government structures are under pressure. New approaches such as **EGov 3.0** demand not only technological innovation but also a redesign of collaboration, service delivery, and customer interaction².

Where EGov 1.0 revolved around automation and EGov 2.0 around process digitalization, **EGov 3.0 focuses on integration, user-centricity, semantic consistency, and human dignity in the digital sphere.** It is the government's version of phygital organization. And it is here that **KIM²** connects seamlessly.

KIM² strengthens EGov 3.0 by:

- providing shared concepts and semantic logic;
- facilitating multidisciplinary collaboration in government chains;
- supporting data-driven and human-centered decision-making;
- training leaders in narrative, multiperspectival, and evidence-informed thinking.

Governments evolving toward EGov 3.0 need leaders and employees who understand this language—who can link digital interaction with citizens to empathy, ethics, and ownership. The **KIM²** dictionary and dialogue cards serve here as strategic instruments for this new governmental reality.

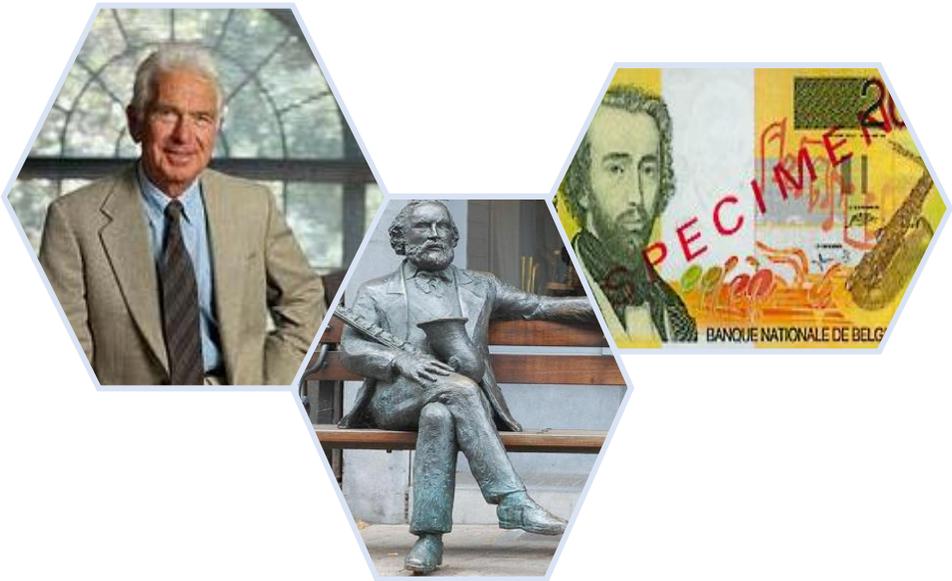

Evidence-Born: Knowledge in Motion as a Score of Change

On how a new concept brings direction, rhythm, and alignment to organizational development

Organizational change cannot be orchestrated like a classical symphony. Rarely is there a single score that is executed collectively and flawlessly. In reality, it resembles jazz: a shared structure with room for timing, dialogue, intuition, and above all: improvisation.

Bennis expressed this aptly in his metaphor of leadership as jazz, a concept that aligns perfectly with how the **KIM² A–Z dictionary** gives meaning to organizing and changing. His comparison unconsciously evokes **Adolphe Sax**, the Belgian instrument maker who designed the saxophone. The saxophone became the epitome of expressive freedom in jazz. Just as a musician searches for their sound through timing and nuance, organizations find their voice through language that moves—from a control instrument to a co-creative score.

The **KIM² A–Z dictionary** serves as a living bridge between evidence and understanding. It is designed as a multi-layered knowledge instrument that supports organizations in meaningful external and internal customer interactions² and sustainable change. It is exactly that: not a static reference, but a living score of language. A knowledge instrument that connects evidence-based precision (scientific definitions, models, frameworks) with evidence-informed wisdom (practical experience, contextual awareness, collective interpretation).

Language in Motion

Change is not the sum of procedures, but an interplay of insights, timing, and meaning. Each term in the dictionary only gains power when knowledge flows into understanding, carried by experience and interaction. In this way, a source of shared language emerges that guides organizations in motion—from word to action, **from data to interpretation**.

In complex change processes, simply using the “right” terms is insufficient. The power of language lies in shared understanding, context-sensitive application, and meaningful use. This is precisely the goal of the **KIM² A–Z dictionary**: language that moves with practice, is embraced by professionals, and guides collective transition.

Scientific Anchoring

A systematic review in *Campbell Systematic Reviews* (2022) confirmed that both **evidence-based (EBP)** and **evidence-informed (EIP)** approaches are widely applied, but their interrelationship is rarely examined. Researchers such as **McSherry et al. (2002)** and **Nevo & Slonim-Nevo (2011)** therefore advocate flexible, context-driven knowledge integration. Within this tension, a new type of knowledge practice emerges: **the birth of a new word—evidensief.**

Where evidence-based and evidence-informed approaches no longer suffice to capture the complexity of knowledge in motion, a new concept is born: **Evidensief** is a way of knowing that starts from substantiated evidence, is nourished by experience, and is shaped through reflective dialogue with people, systems, and contexts.

Dissecting “Evidensief”

1. Word Root: "eviden-"

Derived from the Latin *evidentia* = clarity, obviousness. Both evidence-based (systematic, scientific) and evidence-informed (including practical context) approaches carry this root. "Eviden-" acts as a semantic bridge between both approaches.

2. Suffix: "-sief"

Afgeleid van het Latijnse *-ivus / -sivus*, vertaald als *-ief*: actief, reflexief, intensief. Het duidt een neiging of gerichtheid aan. “-sief” maakt van kennis geen bezit, maar een actieve houding: gericht op toepassing, samenhang en betekenisgeving.

Composition:

Eviden- (evidence, clarity) + **-sief** (orientation, dynamism) = **evidensief**

Why “Evidensief” is More than “Evidence-Informed”

You might think this is simply another word for evidence-informed. But “evidensief” transcends that term: it combines the precision of evidence-based practice with the context-sensitivity of evidence-informed practice, and adds an active, connective language component. It goes beyond informing alone.

Evidensief practice is the epistemological core of this model. It translates knowledge into meaningful interaction, connects insights with organizational reality, and enables shared understanding in motion.

The **KIM² A–Z dictionary** is therefore not a dictionary in the classical sense, but an “evidensief-composed score”: a guiding, context-sensitive, and connective instrument for those who want to use language as a driver of change.

From Insight to Application
